

STEVE AND THE PREGNANCY CEN-TER?"

You would have IF you attended the March Council meeting! During the Lecture portion of the meeting, Ms. Kim Kempf of the Pregnancy Care Center shared a few words describing the center and its activities. The Pregnancy Care Center is a private, non-profit, Christian, pro-life organization whose message is that there is a Heavenly Father to help pregnant woman in need make the right decisions for their lives. The center includes the following among its activities: 24-hour hotline for free pregnancy testing, abortion-accurate information distribution, adoption service and planning, abstinence education and provision of material aid for women in need. The Center will gladly accept donations of clothing, cribs, strollers and other such items to support their material aid provision program. Larger-scale events are also organized by the center to collect funds for their programs. Such events include a "Walk For Life" on 9 May 98 at the Fairfield County Fairgrounds and a "Swing For Life", a scramble golf tournament scheduled for later this year. Ms. Kempf's current desire is to obtain a billboard on State Route 33 to advertise for Pregnancy Care Center on this major traffic route between Lancaster and Columbus. You will find the Pregnancy Care Center located at 201 S. Broad St., Suite 303, Lancaster, OH 43130. They can be reached by telephone at (614) 681 5683. At the conclusion of Ms. Kempf's presentation, Grand Knight George Williams presented Ms. Kempf with a donation from the Council to support the pro-life efforts of the center.

And now for Father Steve. Our own Pastor, Father Steve Hawkins joined the Knights to share his insights on Ireland, a country on his maternal heritage and a country which he has traveled. The geography of Ireland has played a significant role in the historical development of the country. This geography is highlyinfluenced by Ireland's northern global position and its close proximity to the Gulf Stream. These factors create a broad spectrum of volatile weather patterns for this island nation. Weather and

topography drove the migration patterns of the tribal inhabitants creating the provincial structure still inherent within the peoples of Ireland today. Father Steve very adeptly revealed the manner by which Ireland's political and religious history are still evident in the Irish society, especially in the somewhat tumultuous region of Northern Ireland. In a few brief words. Father Steve laid out about 2400 years of history, including the major influence of St. Patrick, which provided a clear and vivid evolution to Ireland's current state of a nation united and yet divided by the influence of English rulers. For those desiring to travel to Ireland on holiday, Father Steve's recommendation is to visit Dublin, Ireland's largest city containing one-quarter of the population, for a couple of days and to travel the Irish countryside, staying in bed and breakfast establishments and experiencing the people and public houses (pubs) which compromise the cultural and social foundation of Ireland. Of course, this discussion wouldn't have been complete without an account of the Irish golfing experience! Father Steve informed us that he has now done everything that an Irish Catholic priest would want to do. He met the Pope, visited the Guinness brewery and kissed the Blarney stone. Our thanks to Father Steve for this entertaining and educational account of the people, country and culture of Ireland.

IN THE CONTINUING STRING OF DIF-FERENCES ...

Next month's planned presentation provides a new look at some different topics. We will continue our current trend of multiple topics within the evening.
