Chancellor's Corner

Historians claim that the holiday of Mother's Day emerged from the ancient festivals dedicated to mother goddess. In the ancient Greek empire, Rhea, the wife of Cronus, and mother of Gods and Goddesses, was worshipped. In Rome too, Cybele, a mother Goddesses, was worshipped, as early as 250 BC. It was known as Hilaria, and it lasted for three days, called the Ides of March, that is from March 15 to March 18. However, neither of them meant for the honoring of our immediate mothers, as is done in our Mother's Day. Rather more closely aligned to our Mother's Day, is the "Mothering Sunday". England observed "Mothering Sunday", or the "Mid-Lent-Sunday, on the fourth Sunday in Lent. In the United States, Anna M. Jarvis (1864-1948) is credited with bringing in the celebration of Mother's day. President Woodrow Wilson, in 1914, made the official announcement proclaiming Mother's Day as a national holiday that was to be held each year on the 2nd Sunday of May.

Mother's Day is a time of commemoration and celebration for Mom. It is a time of breakfast in bed, family gatherings, and crayon scribbled "I Love You's". One of the best ways to celebrate Mother's Day is to give your mom (wife) the day off. Let her take it easy and relax while the rest of the family does the work. Breakfast in bed is a great way to start. Let mom sleep late as they go into the kitchen and prepare her favorite meal. After the food is cooked arrange everything nicely on a tray. Insurance Corner

The Knights of Columbus policy on replacing existing life insurance is as follows: *"The Order does not condone the practice of soliciting replacement insurance or using cash values or dividends of existing policies to finance new business. In most cases, replacement is not to the policyholder's advantage."*

The reasons for this are many. First, premiums usually increase on a new policy because it is issued at an older age. The older you are, the more expensive life insurance is.

Many times, options available under the older policy are lost and sometimes not offered under the new policy. In addition, a new "incontestability" period begins with the new contract. The Order, for example, maintains the right to contest a claim up to two years from the issue date of the policy. A new policy brings with it a new issue date, and a new "incontestability" period.

In My Opinion

One of the most enduring myths surrounding abortion is that *Roe v. Wade* legalized abortion for only the first three months of pregnancy. You may be wondering why the most basic fact about the Supreme Court's abortion rulings (that they made abortion legal for all nine months) is still a mystery to many after 32 years of legalized abortion and a decade of talk about partial-birth abortion. This confusion is the result of efforts by the abortion lobby, pollsters, and many in the media to keep people in the dark. And there is a sound reason for the subterfuge – the public is very negative about taking the lives of unborn children when they undeniably look and act like human children.

Lately, a number of polls from major polling companies have continued to show majority (though dwindling) support for *Roe v. Wade*. Two late 2004 polls asked the identical question: “*The 1973 Supreme Court ruling called Roe v. Wade made abortion in the first three months of pregnancy legal. Do you think President Bush should nominate Supreme Court justices who would uphold this decision?*” With that very misleading description of *Roe*, it was no surprise that respondents favored upholding the decision, by margins of 59% to 31%.

A March 2005 Harris Poll found that support for *Roe* dropped from 57% to 52% since 1998 while opposition has grown to 47% from 41%. While this is a good thing, even these figures are deceiving. Once again, the pollster (this time flagrantly) mischaracterizes the abortion decisions: “In 1973, the U.S. Supreme Court decided that state laws which made it illegal for a woman to have an abortion **up to three months of pregnancy** were unconstitutional, and that the decision on whether a woman should have an abortion **up to three months of pregnancy** should be left to the woman and her doctor. In general, do you favor or oppose this part of the U.S. Supreme Court decision **making abortions up to three months of pregnancy legal?**” (emphasis added)

The poll's methodology raises further questions: the telephone poll was conducted among a “nationwide cross section of 1012 adults ... of whom 442 identify themselves as Pro-Life and 512 identify themselves as Pro-Choice.” When you poll 70 more pro-choice people than pro-life people, wouldn't that skew the averages about 7% in the pro-choice direction?

But here's the most galling part: Question 1 (above) – which *everyone* reported and *nobody* questioned – is flatly contradicted by the results of Question 5, which asks “In general, do you think that abortion should be legal or illegal during the following stages of pregnancy?” The choices are “the first three months”, “the second three months”, and “the third three months”. **72% of respondents think abortion should be illegal in the second trimester and a whopping 86% think abortion should be illegal in the third trimester.** Not one published report could be found to point out that this question reveals the real level of opposition to *Roe* – because it doesn't fit the media's pro-abortion bias.

Even claims of majority support for abortion in the first trimester are open to question. When asked if abortion should be permitted after the unborn child's heart has begun to beat, 61% answered “no”. A baby's heartbeat can be detected at 21-22 days after conception. And 65% said abortions should not occur after fetal brainwaves have been detected; they are recordable at 40 days (less than halfway through the first trimester).

The moral of this story is that we cannot assume people know the basic facts about abortion, beginning with how extreme - and out of the mainstream of public sentiment – the *Roe* and *Doe* decisions are. So what can you do? Start by writing to your U.S. Senators to urge them to end the “Roe litmus test” for appointing federal judges. Tell your family, relatives, friends, and fellow Knights the true abortion facts and urge them to write their Senators. Finally, support “life begins at conception” acts that are currently being considered in both the House and the Senate.
