Meditation for December 2025

Reflection for December

This year we began Advent on November 30 with the Gospel of Matthew (24:37-44) reminding us of Christ's teaching **"you also must be prepared, for at an hour you do not expect, the Son of Man will come."** While Advent is a time of preparation for the birth of Christ, it is also a time to reflect on **Memento Mori** (Remember Death) a pledge we all made upon entering the Knights. It is not a macabre fear of dying, but rather a looking ahead to being in heaven with Christ and all our fellow Christians and family. Below is the new editor of Magnificat magazine Father Philip Nolan, O.P.'s reflection on this time:

Facing the unknown

Uncertainty marks every beginning in human life. As I begin this exciting ministry with Magnificat, I have, of course, some sense of what will be required of me. But, if I'm honest, I'm also a bit intimidated by the many unknown tasks that surely await. Such is life. All of us wake up not knowing what the day will bring. Parents welcome new children into the world, not knowing who these little ones will become. Marriages begin with spouses not knowing the detailed ways in which they will be asked to live out their vows. We walk the path of life with no way of telling what's around the next bend.

Very often, our ignorance of tomorrow becomes today's anxiety. We try to prepare for every contingency, but in the end that's impossible and leaves us exhausted. For the Christian, however, ignorance of the future need not be cause for terror. Why? Because we know that whatever else comes, the good Lord will be there. We do not always know how he will come. We do know that he will come. At an hour you do not expect, the Son of Man will come.

He will come, whether swaddled in a manger, stripped on the cross, or raised in glory. He will come in the gift of a deepened faith. He will come in the strength he gives us when he asks us to bear what we never thought ourselves capable of enduring. He will come in a surprise moment of understanding in a difficult relationship. And, ultimately, he will come when we pass beyond the veil of this life. However frightening the future may look, for us it also bears a promise—the promise of theophany, an encounter with our God.

While we do await the full revelation of his presence, even now God is already with us to lead us through what lies ahead. He is behind and before (Ps 139:5). He led us along the path that brought us to today and awaits us on the path ahead. Our prayer is a cry for direction, a need so beautifully expressed by Saint John Henry Newman:

**Lead, Kindly Light, amid the encircling gloom,
Lead Thou me on;
The night is dark, and I am far from home,
Lead Thou me on.
Keep Thou my feet;
I do not ask to see the distant scene;
one step enough for me.**

We head into the unknown, but we are sure of our guide. If we cannot see tomorrow, it is because he is asking us to trust him today. If we are lost, he is seeking us. If we are afraid to start, he is gently drawing us forward. Yes, there is much we do not know about the future. But we know this: he will be there.

Health Corner - December 2025

Winter Health and Wellness Tips

Happy Advent Brothers!

Below are some suggestions for staying safe and healthy this winter season:

Stay well hydrated. According to Massachusetts General Hospital (and Massachusetts sure knows something about winter temperatures) cold weather can make you feel less thirsty. Reduced thirst, coupled with the extra physical activities of the season (shoveling snow, holiday shopping or decorating) can greatly increase your risk of dehydration. Tips for winter hydration: sip on warm water, hot herbal teas, or a cup of steaming low sodium broth. Make lots of homemade soups with vegetables and snack on fruits and veggies that have a high water content (for example: melons, tomatoes, celery, and citrus fruits). Limit caffeine intake because it is a diuretic. If you can't give up coffee, drink one extra glass of water for every cup.

Use a humidifier. During very cold days when the furnace is constantly running, the air in your home can become extremely dry. According to Cleveland Clinic, this can reduce the ability of your nasal passages to trap germs. If your home doesn't have a furnace humidifier, you can purchase some inexpensive room home humidifiers.

Take Airborne, Emergen-C, or other immunity supplements before travel or big holiday parties. Give your immune system a boost ahead of time when you know you will be around a big group of people or crammed into a full plane for Christmas travel.

Carry an emergency winter kit in your car. In case a sudden or unexpectedly strong winter storm strands you somewhere, it's good to carry an emergency kit. Things to include: high calorie and protein filled snacks, 6 bottles of water, a candle and matches, a heavy blanket. Also, you may want to include a bright colored scarf or bandanna to tie around your car antenna if you are stuck on the road in a blizzard.

Stay up to date on your shingles, flu, and pneumonia vaccines. **Do holiday shopping early in the morning to reduce stress and exposure to winter illnesses.** Early shopping + less traffic + fewer people out + less congested shopping aisles = less stress and germ exposure.

Eucharistic Adoration. Outside of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, there is no better way for a Catholic and Brother Knight to reduce stress amid holiday preparations than to spend time with our Lord in Adoration. If you find your schedule is packed with the holiday hustle and bustle, even 15 minutes spent with our Lord in Eucharistic Adoration is the best time well spent. You can stop at the Seton Adoration Chapel before or after work.

Jesus is there waiting 24/7 to spend time with you!

I pray the Lord blesses you and your families as the Church begins another Liturgical year! Happy Advent and Merry Christmas!
